#### **STUDENT FREE DAYS FOR 2020**

Student free days are days designated for staff or school professional learning activities. Student free days allow schools to release all staff to attend collaborative professional learning or training. This may include attending sessions with experts in a particular field, curriculum planning and development, mandated training requirements and student assessment and reporting. In all government schools, the first day of term 1 is a student-free day to allow for appropriate planning to take place for the new school year.

Our student free days for 2020 will include:

*March* **27th**—Open-ended Problems and activities to cater for the range of abilities in your classroom.

**June 3rd**—Education Leadership Conference—this includes a raft of different workshops facilitated by leading experts in Education.

July 28th—all staff will be doing Cultural Understanding and Safety Training (CUST) The purpose of the training is to increase understanding of Koorie culture, history and experience to ensure a strong foundation for culturally inclusive practices. The training is designed to reach the entire school community (leadership groups, teachers, and education support staff and school council)

#### **KITCHEN PROGRAM**

#### **JUNIOR CLASSROOM**

The junior grade have been learning about and practicing the reading strategy 'skippy frog' this week. It's great to see them using lots of tools to help them read new and unknown words!


In writing we have been filling our writer's notebooks with ideas, things we love and responses to visual prompts. These entries are helping us to set our writing goals, as well as getting us used to writing for a sustained length of time.

In maths we are learning about asking questions to collect data, and then using that data to make displays that we can talk about. To boost our number sense, we have been playing games like number tiggy.

As part of our inquiry unit, the junior grade will be making timelines of how they have grown and changed. We are asking that parents please bring in some small photos of your children as babies, toddlers and perhaps even some kindergarten photos. These will be photocopied and returned to you.







#### SENIOR CLASSROOM

The Senior Class has settled into their reading groups well. The class always have a weekly reading goal that we want to achieve by the end of Friday. This week's Goal is Comprehension- retell a story and use our background knowledge. A small group of students our looking at analysing the text structures and language features using different texts.

Our Emerald Group are reading texts and answering questions about what they are reading to enhance their understanding.



## BRINGING NATIVE BEES, BUGS AND BUTTERFLIES BACK TO DGPS PROJECT.

Last Thursday, Sam Harrison from Landcare came to school to start planning our 'Bringing Native Bees, Bugs and Butterflies project. This project will include the rejuvenating of the strip of land on the border of the school and the car park, planting a range of indigenous flowering plants that will attract a range of native bees, bugs and butterflies into the school.

Students will be involved in the entire process, from planning the design, sourcing the plants and planting to using the garden as part of our STEM Friday program, where we will use the garden as a platform for collecting, studying and documenting the bees, bugs and butterflies that use this new habitat.

This project will enhance biodiversity within our school grounds, make an important habitat corridor link to the nearby Deep Creek reserve and increase the number of native pollinators in and around our school.

Our project will not only increase the abundance and diversity of the native bees, butterflies and other insects that call this area home, but will also be an important showcase for gardening with indigenous plants, adding colour to the entrance to our school.

Importantly, selecting indigenous plants will mean that maintenance and watering will be minimal once the plants have been established.
